### **Fall Book Sale**

Our fall book sale took place on Saturday 17 September and Saturday 24 September 2016. The weather cooperated and helped to facilitate a large turnout. The first Saturday netted approximately \$ 2,300 and the second Saturday brought in \$ 1,300, for an overall total of just over \$3,600, which compares very favorably with our prior sales. All of the monies raised will go toward enhancing the operation of our local Ridgecrest Branch Library.



Summer Reading Challenge statistics are in, and we had a very successful summer. We had a total of 334 children, 21 teens, and 25 adults finish the "Read for the Win" Summer Reading Challenge of reading 10 books or more. In fact, there was a total of 5,005 books read by Ridgecrest Branch Library borrowers in June and July of 2016. This summer we tried having activities more often in response to people requesting activities on other days because certain days didn't work out well for them to attend. It was a lot of work but we managed to have activities on multiple days of the week, every week of Summer Reading Challenge.

The library is working hard to transform our image of being "a building with books" to being something more in the community. Community partnerships are definitely a way to do that. This past August, there was a partnership formed between the Desert Empire Fairgrounds, Ridgecrest Addiction Awareness, and the Ridgecrest Branch Library to plan a Glow Run. Funds raised from this event would be used to target programs for our teen population. The Glow Run was a huge success, with \$900 going towards each group involved, and the date is already set for Glow Run 2017. Another new event the library put on was a Pub Trivia with permission from Casey's Steaks and BBQ. The Pub Trivia event is something that Beale has been doing monthly at a local brewery. Casey's was determined to be the best location for a Ridgecrest Pub Trivia event, and there were 5 teams and 26 people in attendance. The current plan is to start up again in 2017 with a regular Pub Trivia every other month. Teams of 3-5 people test their brains and at the end, the winning team members get to choose a \$10 gift certificate.

Some exciting news! Kern County Library has received a \$75,000 Library Services and Technology grant from the California State Library to start a pilot project at the three busiest branches: Beale Memorial, Ridgecrest, and Southwest. The "We Tech So You Tick" grant will provide digital literacy workshops, portable chargers, Chromebooks for in-house checkout, and wired furniture (similar to what has already been purchased by the Friends). When the Community Surveys were done at the Kern County Library branches, two technology priorities were identified: seating and tables to plug in their devices and more technology training and workshops. Since digital literacy and internet access are now needed for many daily tasks, this project will address needs of the communities served by the Kern County Library system in an attempt to bridge the gap. We should be seeing this new stuff in the coming months. And in other exciting (and related) news, this means that the money that was previously earmarked for additional furniture can now be spent on other things.



### **Little Free Libraries**

Many of you have seen some of the small libraries in yards in town and in other communities. There are a variety of designs but most of them are small and have only one or two rows of books.

In Ridgecrest, two are registered in the official guide to Little Free Libraries with the Little Free Library Organization, <u>littlefreelibrary.org</u>. Others exist but may not be officially numbered and registered. These little libraries fill in the gaps for many who may find travel difficult or expensive and those who may be socially isolated.

The usual mini library is tiny, and is housed in a wooden box or covered shelf. It operates on the simple principle of take one and leave one. Some are well built and painted or crafted into barns, trains, and other interesting shapes. They are only censored or controlled by the users themselves. Some may separate children's books from adult books, yet few experience problems of graffiti, theft, or damage. No charges for borrowing, or late fees are incurred. There is no policing and rarely are policies needed.

There is one organization, Little Free Libraries, <u>littlefreelibrary.org</u>, that provides appropriate guidelines and blueprints. They encourage registration and a small fee that entitles the library steward to a sign and number. That allows one to put the library on the world map.

The Little Free Library organization was founded in 2009 by Ted Bol to honor his book-loving mother. He hoped to meet Andrew Carnegie's library number of approximately 2,500 libraries and he has well exceeded that goal. The website tells that now over 40,000 Little Free Libraries exist worldwide. They explain their goal is "to promote literacy and the love of reading by building free book exchanges worldwide and to build a sense of community as we share skills, creativity and wisdom across generations".

These libraries have their own discoveries to share. As a visitor looks in the box, he or she usually finds something new. Fiction readers might find a book on birds; a history buff might find a book of poetry. Some readers include notes and reviews of the books inside, others try not to make any marks. Each individual embarks on their own special adventure as they seek a book from a very limited selection. Instead of finding the small collection an obstacle, it is viewed as a challenge – to locate some book still worthy of one's time. Serendipity rules here.

The greatest enjoyment comes to the "steward" as he or she learns what books are popular, and often meets new neighbors, and makes new friends. A recent note to a steward read – "We just moved to the neighborhood and Ridgecrest. Delighted to have this little library just up the street. Dropped off a few books. Thanks for the local sprit." What a great reward for sharing books!!
